Domed on the back, so in many cases you can just drill a small hole for the loop and glue in place - or inset into the gourd surface. The design goes well with leather tooling patterns, too. Feature - 2014 Special Artistry Award

The American Gourd Society has established a special Jim Story award for growing manipulated gourds, but surprisingly, there has never been an equivalent special award for gourd ART. We decided that it was time to offer a special cash prize for "Artistry", and during 2014, there were monthly notices posted in each of the Arizona Gourds newsletters. The requirements for entering were that the piece had to be entered in an AGS sanctioned event such as a state show, and it had to win either a Best of Division, People's Choice, Best of Show, or be entered into a non-judged Grand Masters category in order to qualify. There was a bit of confusion this year as people were not really sure which awards and which shows qualified, but I plan to sponsor this award again for 2015 and will clarify who may enter. I'd like to suggest that show chair persons either send in all qualifying entries or encourage their winners to enter!

The winner of this award receives either a \$100 cash award or a \$150 merchandise credit from Arizona Gourds. In addition, the state society where the winner won their prize will also receive a \$50 cash award!

I am posting ALL of the entries I received this year, and even though only one entry wins the cash award, each piece is beautiful in its own right. The judging was difficult, so everyone who qualified and entered should consider themselves a winner! The judging was done by 3 gallery owners who are also artists themselves. They had a very tough time coming up with the results since the works were all very different from each other.

It is titled "Raptors" and is a wrap-around design featuring five raptor faces: an eagle, a Cooper's hawk, a gyrfalcon(white phase), a peregrine falcon and a kestrel. It is carved, burned, stained and painted with openwork branches throughout the design. Michelle's father, Dale Green, made the custom metal-work base, and Michelle added the finishing color on it to complement the colors in the gourd.




















No Judge's Choice, Sponsor's awards or Chairman's awards will be accepted for 2015 in order to keep the number of entries manageable.

Repeat Feature: Pointers to help you enjoy a gourd show!

- 1) Make a list of what raw gourds and supplies you REALLY need. Make a list, and write down everything you can think of. Then, prioritize which items you must purchase and the ones that you can live without. If you need any tools or books, add them to the list too. Write down specific questions you want to ask vendors about tool use, glues, materials, etc. Set a budget and plan to stick to it.
- 2) Be prepared to walk a lot, and take a fold up shopping bag and drinking water with you. You may also want to pack a light healthy snack to avoid the temptation to buy expensive, fattening goodies. Walk around the show area first, just checking it out and asking prices, and making mental notes of where you saw things of interest. Then do a second round and buy the things on the top of your list first. (However, if you see something truly exceptional and one of a kind, you may have to make a snap decision or risk losing out!)
- 3) When choosing what to wear to the show, add a gourd name tag or other gourd jewelry. These items are eye-catchers, which will lead to compliments and comments, and is a great way to make new friends. You may even want to wear your State Society T-Shirt or Gourd Art Enthusiast apparel to connect with others. Dress in layers as it may be cold in the morning and heat up later in the day. Wear comfortable shoes, as many show venues are on hard concrete or uneven gravel.
- 4) Be prepared with cash and checks as well as credit cards, as smaller vendors very often do not accept credit cards. If you use a credit card, please be aware that venue may not be accessible to good cell signals and it may be difficult for the vendor to complete a transaction. Always carry some cash or checks as alternate methods of payment just in case. (Note - this is definitely true at the Wuertz festival - cell access is poor and a lot of the vendors do not take credit cards.)
- 5)When you ask prices on finished gourd art, make sure you take into account factors such as quality of the work, originality, and your own gut feeling. Remember that many new artists often make the mistake of pricing their work too low. Their first show may be your only opportunity to purchase a particular artists' piece at a low price.
- 6) Allow yourself some splurge money, but determine how much before arriving at the show. After you have done all your priority shopping, then you can just buy what you like, but only up to your preset max. If you can, take a break halfway through the show and evaluate your current purchases. Have you ever realized halfway through the show that you bought certain items twice, at different vendors?
- 7) Shows are the best place to actually try out tools to see which woodburner, saw or other tool really works well for you. Don't just take the word of the vendor that their tool is "the best". Whenever possible, try it yourself. Does the tool meet your needs, is it within your budget? Ask other gourders you meet at classes or at the show for their opinion. People that actually use these tools day to day will give you a more honest assessment than you may get from an inexperienced but eager sales person.
- 8) When purchasing, ask the name of the vendor for their card or write the cost of the item and the name of the supplier on the package, business card or receipt. This helps you to remember the cost of certain items, where to buy more of a specific or hard to find item from a supplier in the future; and to write accurate descriptions of the materials used in your gourd creations. Remember, most of the vendors are people who love gourds just like you do, and they can become good friends. Later on, you can contact them and buy needed items direct.
- 9) Always ask first before taking photographs at a show. Some vendors will have a sign posted if they do not want you to take pictures. Never assume that it is ok; it only takes a few seconds to ask, and the vendor will appreciate the courtesy.
- 10) Finally, wash your hands after leaving the show. Handling raw gourds and even supplies all day can leave you feeling grubby. When leaving, ask for a "return pass" at the exit if you intend to return, most shows allow re-entry later that day.

Most of all, remember to have fun... !!!

Tip of the Month: Abranet Sanding Mesh

I visited the International Woodturners Symposium this past summer, and enjoyed visiting the vendor booths. While I was there, I purchased some "Abranet" sanding mesh and I am totally sold! This sanding mesh lasts for a long time even with heavy use, and because it is on a mesh, the sanding dust doesn't clog the surface the way that it does with ordinary sandpapers. It's great for both hand sanding and for use with power sanders. Abranet has a fuzzy "grip" backing that works well with hook and loop fasteners, and I like it so well that I have recently converted some of my disc sanders for use with Abranet. Here's how I did it:



I began with the hard plastic disc that came with my Microlux disc sander, and added a 3/16" thick disc cut from soft foam sheet purchased from the craft store. I used some spray contact cement (spray adhesive) to adhere the foam to the disc. This foam cushion provides a little "give" so the sander rides better on the gourd surface. Just trace around the disc and cut the foam with a pair of scissors.

Next, I cut a piece of hook and loop backing material and attached it to the other side of the foam. This is the hook portion of a velcro type fastening sheet. This particular piece had some adhesive on the back side, but you could use spray adhesive for this part as well. See the disc, foam and fastener sandwich created in the photo below.

Next, I took a regular drill bit and drilled through all of the lavers. Place the disc with the fastener side down on a piece





While this sandpaper is a bit pricey, it lasts so long and is so easy to use that I think it is well worth the cost. The Abranet assortment pack shown to the left is available on Amazon in an assortment of grits from 80 - 600.


Rolls of 10 or 25 yards and precut discs are also available, but an assortment is a good way to try out the product.

of wood so that you can drill a clean hole all the way through the 3 layers. These holes allow the sanding dust to escape through the Abranet mesh while the sander is turning. The manufacturer suggests that a foam backing with vent holes will extend the life of the Abranet mesh.

The photo to the right shows the disc from the other side, with a piece of the Abranet cut to fit and attached to the hook and loop fastener. You can see through the mesh and to the drilled holes on the backing. Abranet is available in sheets and rolls that are the perfect size to cut into discs with very little waste, and it comes in many grits. Or, use it for hand sanding!

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
Instead of books this month, I am showing some of the more popular and unusual gourd tool finds ordered through our Amazon links!
